## **From the Pastor,**

If you have heard me talk recently about any of the outreach events we do, you will have heard me mention the power of building relationships. Jesus used relationships to introduce people to the Kingdom of God. The apostles used relationships to spread the good news across the Mediterranean. An apostle would enter a community and begin teaching and talking in the local synagogue, eventually that leads to deeper conversations about Jesus.

While we aren't foreigners to our community, or just traveling through, Christian faith is foreign to our contemporary culture. Give the (shall we say?) maturity of our congregation, we may not even be aware of how different we have become. Much of our culture thinks of Christians and church people specifically as being weird. People in our culture may say that they believe in God, but living the Christian life is still generally considered outside what is now normal...imagine?

So when we here at CUMC offer any event to build relationships it is for the purpose of letting people know we aren't weird. Well maybe a little weird, but not out of place weird. People who aren't a part of the church spend time with some of us and start to get to know us. They figure out we don't hit people in the head with a Bible, or are missing a sense of humor, or are going to condemn them for any number of things people think Christians are opposed to.

As people get to know us and know about us we become a bridge for the love of God and the Good News, because they discover our warmth, humor and humanity. The purpose of outreach events isn't just for fun, in fact it's much more important than that.

I heard a story on the evening news this week about the power of such relationships. A police officer drove a young man MANY miles to attend a family funeral. This was a surprise for a couple of reasons. The police officer was white and the young man was African American. When they arrived at the destination, the police officer asked the young man if he could pray for him, and when the young man said yes, the officer did just that. The young man later reported that he was deeply moved by the whole experience, including the prayer.

We may not extend an offer to pray every time we meet someone new...that might just confirm that Christians are a little weird. But we certainly can be available to be in relationship with people that might lead to who knows what?

The Food Pantry contracted to have the Mobile Food Pantry (commonly called the “food truck”) come out August 24 to distribute free food to families in our community. We served 50 families, and used the leftovers as stock for the Food Pantry.

To have the truck come out filled with food, the Food Pantry pays a fee of \$1,000.

Thanks to all the volunteers who came and helped. It was a fun and rewarding day, and was a great, visible reminder to people in the community of the work we do.

## **Manna Scrip Fundraising Program Comes to Community**

### **What is it, you say?**

A way to raise funds for our ministries without adding any additional cost to participants using scrips. SCRIP is a Latin word that means, “Anything used instead of money”.

### **How can that be, you say?**

Participants purchase gift cards (scrip) at face value for their everyday purchases, gift-giving and shopping, turning everything from groceries, gas, travel, restaurants and online shopping into profit! Scrip fundraising operates by offering gift cards and gift certificates at a discount. Participants are able to redeem the gift cards and certificates at full face value in stores, at restaurants or online. The difference between the face value and the discount of the gift card is retained by the church as profit.

### **What type of gift cards/gift certificates are available, you say?**

The 300+ gift cards and certificates that are offered through The Manna Group are the same gift cards found and purchased from local and national retailers. We offer local and national groceries, gas stations, retail, restaurants, travel, online retailers, hospitality, and more!

### **Do gift cards expire, you say?**

No, however, on occasion there may be a non-usage fee applied. This is typically due to a specific amount of time being surpassed without usage. Please see the Vendor Guidelines portion of our website for further details. The Manna Group does offer a Visa Prepaid Rewards card that is only valid for 6 months from the date of purchase.

### **Who is The MANNA GROUP SCRIP COMPANY, you say?**

Established in 1989, The MANNA GROUP SCRIP COMPANY provides scrip fundraising to the nonprofit community. We have grown to be the second largest and longest running scrip provider in the United States. As the original and #1 Scrip Company serving the Chicagoland area we have become known for our high standard of service. The Manna Group Scrip Company is partnered with over 300 national and local gift card/gift certificate programs while offering a fundraising program that allows the nonprofit community to fundraise while they shop.

### **When can I find out more?**

On October 2nd after church in the sanctuary we will begin with a training on electronic giving which will also be the way participants can pay for their manna orders through the church. On October 9th after church in the fellowship room meet with Connie Schweitzer to sign up as a participant and receive the first order form and further details.

### **When can I start buying gift cards?**

Initial orders will be accepted on October 23rd and the first distribution date will be October 30th. Orders beginning in November will be accepted on the 1st and 3rd Sundays with the distributions on the 2nd and 4th Sundays.
